

Medicaid Enrollment: Jan 2023 through September 2025 Renewals






October 2025 Renewals By Age



October 2025 Child Renewals




October 2025 Child Terminations by Reason



Stay Covered: Renew Your Medicaid!



Every **12 months** Medicaid members will go through a renewal process to make sure they are still eligible for coverage. **Keep your information updated!**



A renewal notice is sent at least **45 days before** the due date with instructions and a deadline to submit required information. A reminder is sent about **15 days** before due date.



You can check your renewal month by logging into the Kynect portal or calling the Kynect line. **kynect.ky.gov** or call **855-4kynect (855-459-6328)**. Providers also have access to the renewal date in KYHealthNet.

Send in requested information **right away to avoid losing coverage!** If coverage is terminated, reach out within 90 days to submit information to **reactivate** the case. If outside the 90 days will need to **reapply**.

Renewing Your Child's Health Coverage

Renewing your child's Medicaid or KCHIP is easy and essential. Make sure to follow these steps:

- 1 Update important information in kynect. If anything (address, phone number, email, or income) changes, visit kynect.ky.gov or call 855-459-6328.
- 2 If you hear from us, please respond! You will be notified about Medicaid or KCHIP coverage during the annual renewal period via letter, phone call, and/or text message. The letter will tell you whether you need to complete a form or provide information to keep your coverage active. Please return any forms as promptly as possible.
- 3 Get help any time! Kentucky has many resources available to help you and your family navigate the Medicaid or KCHIP enrollment and renewal process:





State Based Marketplace Updates

Enhanced Tax Credits

- KHBE emphasizing the value of obtaining, using, and keeping health insurance even if/when monthly contribution toward premiums rise.
- Outbound calls being made to each person who is facing 100 dollars per month or more increase to help find an agent and discuss options.
- Contingency Plans have been discussed to prepare for a possible late extension of the tax subsidies in December.

Plan Year 2026


- Reminder that **Open Enrollment** will be **November 1, 2025 through January 15, 2026** with no changes to passive renewals/auto re-enrollment.
- It is important to emphasize that other alternatives to a Qualified Health Plan may have a lower monthly premium but also may not cover pre-existing or other conditions. Some alternatives being advertised may not be health insurance at all—working with Department of Insurance, Kynectors, agents, and advocates to find ways to educate enrollees.

Designed for Medicaid-eligible adults (18+) with Serious Mental Illness (SMI), with or without a co-occurring Substance Use Disorder
Brings 10 essential Home and Community-Based Support (HCBS) services into communities

1915(i) RISE Initiative Recent Developments

- 5 certified providers, with 70+ more currently somewhere in the application/review process.

Program Updates:

- The Reentry Implementation Plan is pending with CMS.
- The Project Team is actively working to ensure system alignment across all platforms.
- DMS continue to collaborate with Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) and Justice Partner regarding contracting and credentialing.
- Provider training and readiness will continue through 2025 into early 2026.

- The Alternative Benefit Plan (ABP) SPA is currently in progress.
- The CAA Grant has been awarded, with funds pending.

1915(c) Community Health for Improved Lives and Development (CHILD) Waiver

What is the 1915(c) CHILD Waiver?

- **Community Health for Improved Lives and Development**

- The CHILD Waiver is a new Kentucky Medicaid program designed to help Kentucky children and youth with significant behavioral health or developmental challenges get the services they need, while staying at home, in school, and in their communities.
- **Anticipated January 2026.**

- **Serving Children & Youth with Most Complex Needs**

- Focused for children and youth stepping out of acute inpatient care or at risk of out-of-home placement due requiring intensive behavioral health and residential supports.
- CHILD waiver includes clinical therapeutic services designed to foster a step-down approach, coming from the highest level of care to return to home and the community.

Who does the 1915(c) CHILD Waiver Help?

- **Children and Youth**
 - Under age 21,
 - With significant behavioral health or developmental needs.
 - Kentucky children and youth who:
 - Need a level of care like what would be provided in an inpatient facility, intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICF/IID), or hospital.
 - Can be safely supported at home or in the community with the right services.

Who does the 1915(c) CHILD Waiver Help?

Enrollment is targeted to those who have exhausted supports and services enabling them to remain in the community and:

- Are or at risk of being unhoused
- Have a history of at least two different foster care placements
- Have at least five contacts with law enforcement
- Is discharging from an institution in the next 45 calendar days



Description	Case management activities include assisting participants in gaining access to waiver services and other needed services through the Medicaid State Plan and other non-Medicaid funded community-based programs to support the participant's home and community-based needs.	Community Living Supports are intended to provide direct one-on-one assistance (including hands-on assistance, reminders, cueing, observation, and training) while facilitating independence and promoting integration into the community.	Environmental and Minor Home Modifications are any necessary adaptations to a private or family residence required to ensure the child or youth's health, welfare, and safety.	Respite services are provided on a short-term basis due to the absence of or need for relief of the primary caregiver.	Supervised Residential Care is targeted to children and youth who require 24-hour intense residential services, and the supports provided in a Supervised Residential Care setting are individually tailored to assist with the acquisition, retention, or improvement in skills related to living in the community.	Clinical Therapeutic Services is approved, based on assessed needs, to support children, youth, and their families in understanding, mitigating, and providing long term solutions for behavior challenges. This service is designed to provide family crisis prevention and stabilization supports to the waiver enrolled child or youth, primary caregiver, family (including foster care families).







Kentucky Immunization Program – what we do

🛡️ Oversee the federal **Vaccines for Children Program** and **317 Adult Immunization Program**.

- Approximately half of Kentucky children receive vaccines through VFC
- Nearly 500 health care clinics in Kentucky are enrolled in VFC

🛡️ Oversee and maintain the **Kentucky Immunization Registry (KYIR)**.






Lead surveillance and disease control activities for vaccine-preventable diseases.

Why it matters

- 🛡️ **Measles:** More cases in the U.S. (& KY) this year than in several decades. USA likely to lose “measles elimination” status.
- 🛡️ **Whooping cough:** more cases in KY this year than in 13 years. Three Kentucky infants have died of whooping cough in the past year.
- 🛡️ **Influenza:** >16K ED visits and hospitalization among KY children for influenza. Eight KY children died of flu last season.
- 🛡️ **COVID-19:** >5,000 ED visits and hospitalizations among KY children for COVID-19. One KY child died of COVID-19.
- 🛡️ ***Haemophilus influenzae*, type b (HIB):** two cases in KY children this year.

Community Health Workers

- Community health workers (CHWs) are a crucial link between health and social services.
- They are not medical providers, but they work with medical practitioners in clinics, hospitals and offices.
- CHWs undergo 40 hours of formal training in 8 core competencies and 40 hours of mentorship prior to certification.
- We have 656 certified CHWs in Kentucky in 117 of our 120 counties

Documentation

There is no requirement the provider must see the patient first. However, the patient's file should clearly document the need for the service.



Files should be kept in patient record for post payment reviews such as:

CHW
Certification

Clinician
Order

Activity
Notes

Care Plan

Services must be delivered according to a plan of care

Services may include

- Health system navigation
- Health promotion and coaching
- Preventative health training and assistance
- Health education and training

MCOs will reimburse for CHWs and may hire their own CHWs



Fee-for-Service Medicaid will reimburse for CHWs

Community Health Workers

- Community based organizations are not currently eligible for reimbursement for CHW services
- If a provider receives federal, state, or private grant funding supporting a CHW, the provider cannot also bill Medicaid for services provided by that CHW for a Medicaid member. Provider must maintain records demonstrating no duplication of funding for the CHW and Medicaid reimbursement.
